 (except working service dogs)

ANIMAL WELFARE

Clackamas County Fair abides by the
 IAFE Animal Welfare Code of Ethics.

NOTE: No automatic watering devices are to be connected to hose bibs in the livestock barn without approval of the Overall Livestock Superintendent.

ALL livestock trailers parked on the Fair Grounds will have the name of the owner and the species on a tag placed on the jack handle or hitch of the trailer. All trailers parked on the fair grounds will incur a parking fee. Tags will be given at the Livestock Office when fee is paid for.

1. All entries should be submitted to the Fair Office, 694 N.E. 4th Avenue, Canby, Oregon 97013 on official Clackamas County Fair entry forms or photocopies.

2. Entries will close at 4:00 p.m. July 10th, and exhibits will be limited to the capacity of the barns with earliest entries received given priority on space. Clackamas County residents will be given preference and entries will be accepted from out of county residents only if adequate space is available.

3. Entries are allowed on the grounds **no earlier than 12 noon on Sunday before fair** and must be in the barn by 11:00 p.m. Monday before the Fair. (See special entry times for Open Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Pygmy Goats, Sheep and Ewe Lead in individual division rules.)

ONCE ANIMALS ARE UNLOADED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS, THEY MAY NOT LEAVE THE FAIRGROUNDS WITHOUT EXPRESS APPROVAL OF THE FAIRGROUNDS VETERINARIAN OR THE OVERALL LIVESTOCK SUPERINTENDENT.

4. No person shall be allowed in the barns after 11:00 p.m. without written permission from the Overall Livestock Superintendent except on entry days.

5. In case of illness, the official veterinarian must make the request to remove an animal from the fairgrounds. No animal may be removed from the fairgrounds or barn without livestock release slip issued by the General Livestock Superintendent. **PREMIUMS WILL BE FORFEITED ON ANY ANIMAL LEAVING BEFORE RELEASE DATE REGARDLESS OF REASON. ONCE REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS, AN ANIMAL MAY NOT BE RETURNED DURING THE FAIR.**

6. After three year's participation, a breed/species may be considered as a class.

7. PASSES: Open Livestock exhibitors in Beef, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goats, Pygmy Goats, Sheep and Swine will be issued as follows: 1-3 head exhibited, 1 pass; 4-6 head exhibited, 2 passes; 7+ head exhibited, 3 passes. No more than 3 passes will be issued.

Beef and Dairy Cattle Season Pass = 2 days (1st) 4 days (2nd)

Dairy Goats Season Pass = 2 days

Pygmy Goats Season Pass = 3 days

Sheep Season Pass = 4 days

Swine Season Pass = 6 days

(SEASON PASS CONSTITUTES EXHIBIT STAY AT FAIR)

8. HELPER PASSES: Main exhibitor of a herd/flock of Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Goat, Pygmy Goats, Sheep and Swine may buy up to two (2) helpers passes at \$3.00 each, for show days only. Helpers pass must be requested on entry form. Helpers passes will **NOT** be sold after entries close. No exceptions.

Open Class livestock exhibitors who have **paid \$50.00 in entry fees** will be entitled to **ONE** complimentary **livestock parking permit**. This is **per exhibitor, not cumulative for a family. Parking permit is only valid during the rotation in which exhibitor has livestock on fairgrounds.** Additional Season parking passes, in General Parking, will be available to exhibitors for a \$25.00 fee.

ABSOLUTELY NO ADMITTANCE at any time through livestock (or any other) gate without gate admission tickets for driver and all passengers.

9. Livestock exhibitors **WHO HAVE PROPER GATE ADMISSION AND PARKING CREDENTIALS** will be allowed to bring vehicles with feed into barn area between 6 a.m. and 9:45 a.m. **ONLY. REMEMBER** you may not enter gates not even to feed without gate admission credentials for vehicle, driver and all passengers. All vehicles, including trucks and trailers, must

be removed from fairgrounds to designated parking areas by 9:45 a.m. daily. Vehicles left in the barn area after 10 a.m. will be towed away at the owner's expense. **ABSOLUTELY NO PARKING IN AREA OF BARN.**

10. Stalls will be assigned.

11. **DO NOT LIST** Champion and Reserve Champion classes on entry blank. Only first prize animals may compete for Champion, and only Champions may compete for Grand Champion. Second place winners are eligible for Reserve Champion.

12. Exhibitors will be limited to two monies in each lot. Two or more entries from one exhibitor or the same family does not constitute competition. Qualified animals from one established herd or flock operated as a breeding unit, even though registered individually to different members of a family or breeding partnership must be shown as a unit.

13. No animal may compete in more than one class or division except as one of a herd, group or championship. 4-H and FFA members may enter open classes. 4-H & FFA members showing in open class must pay regular open class fees & adhere to all open class rules. All 4-H & FFA animals that cross over to show in Open Class, must be penned in 4-H or FFA area.

14. After the release time, it is not to be assumed that representatives of the fair will guard property or animals in owner's absence. Anything left and not personally cared for is entirely at owner's risk, and under no circumstances must anything be left more than 18 hours unless special arrangements are made. Animals left on the Fairgrounds for longer than 18 hours following the close of the Fair shall become property of the Fair Board and will be disposed of at its discretion.

15. Entry fees are non-refundable.

16. All stalls and adjacent areas must be kept neat and clean. Anyone not keeping his or her exhibit area clean will be barred from competition the following year. **NO FEED SHALL BE STORED IN MAIN ALLEYS. NO GENERATORS ALLOWED IN OR AROUND THE LIVESTOCK BARN.**

17. **RELEASE:** See individual divisions for hours of release. Vehicles will be permitted to enter the fairgrounds through designated livestock gate(s) **ONLY.** No livestock vehicles allowed in or out of any gate other than livestock gate. The Fair Board urges your cooperation so that release of animals can be accomplished in an orderly manner, with the least possible delay for everyone. Premiums will be withheld from anyone in violation. No exceptions. **NO LOADING OR UNLOADING FROM FRONT (SOUTH) SIDE OF LIVESTOCK BARN AT ENTRY OR RELEASE TIME. THIS IS A PUBLIC AREA, NOT A LOADING OR UNLOADING AREA.**

18. Bedding must be furnished by the exhibitor. The Fair Board will not provide bedding. **Only fir shavings allowed. Straw allowed for fiber or milking animals ONLY.**

19. Premier Breeder Awards will be awarded if there is competition by two or more breeders. Award to be made to the breeder scoring most points according to the following scorecard. Animals must be bred and owned or co-owned by exhibitor to be eligible. Division participation optional. The points are to be counted as follows: Open Class Placing.

Each 1st - 5 points Each 3rd - 3 points Each 5th - 1 point

Each 2nd - 4 points Each 4th - 2 points

In case of tie refer to General Rule No. 49.

20. Premiums available at time of release.

21. All manure must be placed on manure slabs. Manure **ONLY** can be placed on manure slabs. All other waste and refuse must be placed in waste receptacles.

22. Absolutely no overhead sprinklers allowed in the barns.

23. Exhibit animals will not be muzzled while on the fairgrounds.

24. Exhibitor must be able to prove ownership.

25. NO FOR SALES SIGNS WILL BE PERMITTED IN BARN.

26. Paint will be available on Saturday **ONLY.** No painting to be done on Sunday or Monday.

27. All pens must be cleaned by 8:30am **DAILY.** All 4-H & FFA pens in the ELY barn **will** be cleaned by 8:30am every day.

28. **HEALTH REQUIREMENTS:**

Dr. Mike Harms, DVM is the official veterinarian for the livestock show. The official veterinarian is on the grounds primarily for the inspection of livestock for contagious and communicable diseases. However, Dr. Harms will also provide emergency services for animals at the fair, with a nominal fee to exhibitors to cover the emergency services rendered. Exhibitors may choose to have another veterinarian treat their animals if they prefer. All arrangements and costs are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

All animals are subject to inspection upon admission to the exhibition grounds. No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, etc. The management reserves the right to require health inspections, diagnostic test, treatments, and/or other disease control measures or procedures, which might become necessary. Any tests required by state or federal law will be adhered to. A permit must be obtained from the Veterinary Division, State Department of Agriculture, Salem, Oregon 97310, phone 504-986-4680 for all livestock entering the State of Oregon for exhibition or other reasons. Entry then subject to conditions of the permit. An official Health Certificate Issued by an accredited veterinarian may be required showing the permit number on the face thereof and individual identity of all the animals. In the case of cattle, certificates must accompany the animals.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY SUPREME HERD OR FLOCK AWARD

The Clackamas County Fair will offer a "GO FOR THE GOLD" SUPREME HERD OR FLOCK AWARD to the best herd or flock bred and owned by an exhibitor. Winners will be chosen from the following lots:

- SHEEP Lot 11 DAIRY GOATS Lot 16
- In order to compete for this award, at least fifty percent of the breeds in each species must be exhibited. Sheep: All young flocks must compete.
 - Dairy Goat judging will be held at the completion of Dairy Goat classes, in Ely Arena Show Ring.
 - Sheep Judging will be held after all breeds are shown Friday afternoon.
 - Winner in each species will be presented with a beautiful perpetual trophy, engraved with the winner's name, which will be his to keep for one year. Winner will return the trophy to the Fair to display at the next year's Fair to present to the next year's winner. Winner in each species will also receive a gold medal award, which will be the winner's to keep.
 - In the Sheep Division winner of "Go For the Gold" award will not be eligible to compete for the Clackamas County Young Flock award. Previous winners of this coveted award are:

DIVISIONS "A" & "B"

- All cattle must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. Registration certificates must be presented to superintendent and will be checked prior to show time.
- No cattle will be permitted to enter the show ring unless under the halter and in care of a groom
- All cattle stalls and adjacent space must be kept neat and clean at all times. Any exhibitor not cooperating will be barred the following year and could forfeit their premium money.
- All bulls eight months or older shall be shown with a nose lead or ring.
- HALTER AND NECK ROPE (DOUBLE TIED) ARE REQUIRED ON BEEF AND DAIRY ANIMALS AT ALL TIMES.
- NOTE: Breeds with fewer than three exhibitors will be moved to Other Breeds.** Exhibitors will be notified by July 31st.
- ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE NOT ALLOWED IN OR AROUND BARN. OFFENDERS WILL BE ASKED TO LEAVE AND ALL PREMIUMS WILL BE FORFEITED.**

MILKING PARLOR

A milking parlor is available in the Dairy barn for exhibitors with lactating cows. This parlor was initially sponsored and constructed by the Clackamas County Fair Board in cooperation with many donors and volunteers.

One purpose of the facility is to present to the milk consuming public the story of clean, wholesome, modern milk production.

All milking will be subject to rules and regulations as established by the State Department of Agriculture and the Clackamas County Fair Board.

1. The milking Parlor supervisor shall be in charge of developing a milking schedule. The schedule will be developed in cooperation with the 4-H, FFA and open class dairy superintendents.
2. Exhibitor's missing their assigned milking will postpone use of parlor until other exhibitors have completed their milking. Stanchions will not be reserved.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To ALL 4-H, FFA and Open Class Dairy Exhibitors:

The Clackamas County Fair management has prepared a procedural statement covering the use and control of antibiotics, which will require your signature. In the case of 4-H, FFA & Jr. Open Class exhibitors, it will be necessary to have the parents' signature as well.

1. Antibiotics must not be used (a) Exterior (muscle, uterine & oral injections), (b) Interior (udder infusions) for 7 days prior to the scheduled milking **IMPORTANT! MILK FROM ALL COWS CURRENTLY BEING TREATED WITH ANTIBIOTICS, OR FROM COWS HAVING BEEN TREATED WITHIN THE PAST 7 DAYS OF THE SCHEDULED MILKING MUST BE DUMPED.**
2. Each tank of milk will be sampled and if antibiotics show positive, then it will be necessary to test each cow.
3. As an exhibitor, you are responsible for damages your animals may cause including the loss of other exhibitor's milk. You should check your liability insurance to be certain you are covered. The superintendent will be glad to answer your questions and assist you in this matter. Following are the statements you have to sign.

ANTIBIOTIC AGREEMENTS

I hereby certify that my animal(s) has/have not been treated in any form with antibiotics within 7 days of any scheduled milking at the Clackamas County Fair.

If an individual cow test determines that my animal(s) cause contamination of milk at the Fair, I will pay the value of the milk lost, cost of the test and will forfeit my milk check.

Entries in the Dairy Goat Class must be in the barn by 9 p.m. Monday before the Fair.

RELEASE TIME: 7 p.m. Wednesday, August 19. Animals must be removed promptly in order that pen space can be cleaned to make room for sheep. All dairy goats must be out of the barn by 9:00 p.m.

Mark pen space on entry form. Bedding must be furnished by exhibitor.

All dairy goats six months of age and older must have a registration or recordation certificate and appropriate tattoo marks. The registration or recordation certificate or the stamped duplicate applications showing the date received by the American Dairy Goat Association office is required for any animal under six months of age.

The American Dairy Goat Association recognizes this show as an official show and A.D.G.A. rules shall govern. The Junior and Senior shows are not separately sanctioned.

The base date for computing the age of the animal shall be the day the animal is to be judged.

The general rules and regulations in the front of the premium list and livestock department rules apply to this division.

See judging schedule at front of handbook for show times. There will be a short exhibitor's meeting Wednesday afternoon.

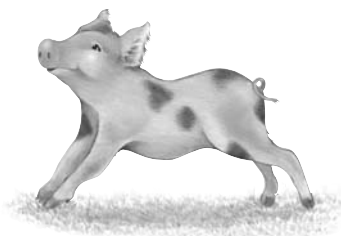

1. Vehicles are not allowed on the grounds while fair patrons are present (No exceptions)
2. Animals will be accepted in the showroom from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday, the day before fair begins.
3. This is a cooped show. All animals shall be placed in assigned coops. Carrying cages must be removed from the fair grounds after animals are cooped.
4. Each animal shall have a temporary coop number placed in its right ear by its owner at check-in.
5. All rabbits must be identified by a permanent and legible tattoo in the left ear prior to being cooped on Monday. Tattoos will not be provided by the show staff.
6. All rabbits must be at least 12 weeks of age and meet minimum weight requirements as printed in the ARBA book of standards, by the first day of fair.
7. All animals must remain on exhibit from 8:00 am Tuesday through 8:00 pm Sunday. Only animals that become ill may be excused for early release by a superintendent.
8. Rabbits must be entered under the true owner's name.
9. Diseased or unsightly animals shall be removed from the fair grounds at the superintendent's discretion and entry fees will be forfeited.
10. All animals are entered at the owner's risk. Our best efforts will be given to provide for the health and safety of each animal in our care. However, we accept no liability for injury, illness or death of an animal.
11. Show staff will feed each animal daily using a single brand of feed and fresh water will be provided continuously to all rabbits. Owners desiring to feed their own animals must obtain a special sticker from the superintendent and attach it to the coop card. If you choose to feed your own animals you will be required to provide your own feed. You will need to carry your feed in with you each day and take it with you when you leave. There is no room in the show room to store additional feed. You may feed only once in a 24-hour period. Cage doors may be opened only to discard of old feed and replace with new. The rest of the time the cage doors are

to remain closed. All caution should be made not to disrupt fair goers. **No passes will be given for fair entry.**

12. Any exhibitor, who is disruptive or interferes in any way, is subject to having their stock removed from the show room and will forfeit entry fees and any premiums due them.
13. Any entry changes must be done through and approved by one of the superintendents.
14. Submission of an entry form indicates that you understand and agree to abide by all rules as set forth.
15. Judges decisions and remarks are final.
16. If you wish to sell stock you must complete and sign a sales form and agreement. A non-refundable sales fee of \$1 must be submitted along with the sales form. All sales fees will be applied towards to the Build A Barn Fund. All rabbit sale transactions must be made through a superintendent. A "For Sale" sticker will be issued for each animal listed on your sales agreement. You may display business cards, however no other sale signs will be allowed without Superintendent's authorization. Animals cooped as 4-H entries are exempt from the sales fee.
17. At checkout on Sunday each animal's ear number will be checked against the owners entry form or buyer's official sales receipt prior to leaving the showroom.
18. Any rabbits not collected by 8:00 pm Sunday evening will be dealt with at the superintendent's discretion.
19. This is an official ARBA sanctioned show. All disqualification's and ARBA class structures and rules shall apply, in addition to those described above.
20. Fairgrounds, Fair Management, Fair Staff and Rabbit Superintendents are not responsible for lost, stolen, or misplaced animals. Purchaser assumes all liability regarding purchased animals.

HINTS ON PREPARING YOUR FLOWERS FOR THE FAIR

Gather flowers early in the morning or late in the evening. Place stems immediately in cool water (the first 30 seconds are what counts). Set container in a cool, draft-free place. Use a sharp knife and cut stem on a slant. Crush wood stems for at least 2". Let stand in deep water overnight. Example: Chrysanthemums, Lilacs and Roses. Roses may be cut and placed in water in the refrigerator and protected by paper. Remove foliage of Asters, Zinnias, Stock, Snapdragons below the water line for arrangements. Stray petals can be removed without harming the quality of the flower. Carnations, Dahlias, Chrysanthemums should be cut when fully open. Most others, when buds are just beginning to open. A judge would rather see a flower coming into bloom than when the prime is past. Gladioli should be evenly spaced on the stalk. Dahlias are hollow stemmed. Place cut Dahlia stems to a depth of 2-3" in 160-180O water, protecting the blooms and leaves from the heat and steam by a collar of paper. Let stand in water in a cool shaded area for 2 hours or more, then add more water. Annuals such as Marigold, Asters, Cornflowers only require immediate submersion in cool water - overnight, if possible. It is important that all exhibits be named correctly. Check your exhibits for insect damage. Groom and clean your horticulture specimens. For ideas on arranging, our local library has many beneficial books for everyone. Transport your entries carefully so they do not bend and break or get bruised.

5. All horticulture specimens must be grown by the exhibitors. Name horticulture specimens if at all possible. Preference given to named varieties when judging. All horticulture specimens must have their own foliage except where noted. Judges may be impressed by grooming and staging of exhibits.
6. Material used in the arrangements division must be field grown. Arrangements must be made by the exhibitor.

8. Professional or licensed growers or florists may not enter in amateur division.

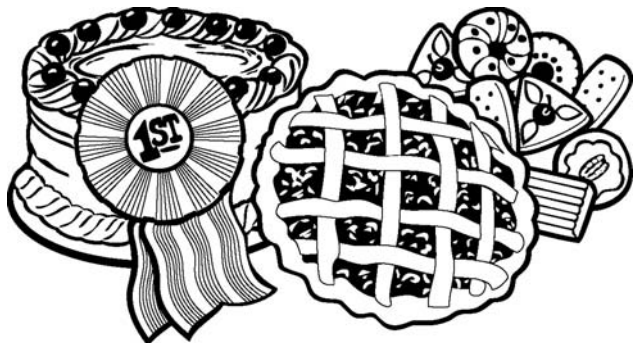

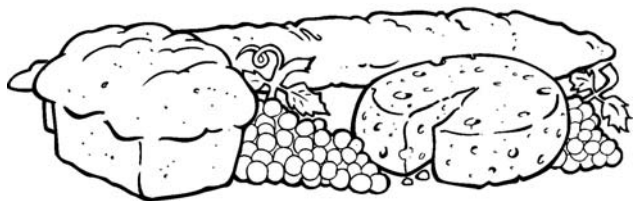
