ATTENTION EXHIBITORS - SAVE TIME ON ENTRY DAY

We urge you to bring a completed entry form to the fairgrounds with your entries. If you have a number of entries, we suggest that for each entry you also bring gummed name and address labels to be placed on your exhibitor entry tags. This will avoid the tedious task of filling in your name in pen or pencil on each entry tag.

NO ENTRY FEES

1. All entries must be grown by exhibitor.
2. Entries are limited to Oregon grown products and must be grown by exhibitor.
3. Entries accepted Monday, August 17, **11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Entries WILL NOT be accepted after 8:00 p.m.** It is requested that exhibitors with numerous entries MUST BE IN THE DEPARTMENT at least one hour before entries close.
4. **RELEASE TIME:** Entries may be picked up from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday, the day following the Fair or by arrangement with Superintendent. Checks for premiums will be given out by the superintendent as exhibits are released, when possible. NO CHECKS OR RIBBONS will be mailed.
5. Varieties not listed may be exhibited but not entered for premiums.
6. No item may be entered for more than one premium.
7. All packages must have name and full address of exhibitor on package or box; also variety of item contained therein.
8. An exhibitor may make only one entry per lot.
9. Products must be grown this year unless otherwise mentioned. Grains, nuts and grasses that do not mature before the fair may be products of last year and must be so marked.
10. No awards will be made if not warranted.
11. To be a successful exhibitor, you are urged to make every effort to have mature fruits and vegetables of excellent quality that are thoroughly clean. If you have further questions about preparing your vegetables for showing, contact the Clackamas County Extension Office. Bulletins on the subject are available.

JUNIOR GARDENER:

Exhibitors 15 and under will exhibit as Junior Gardener. Juniors are welcome to compete in any category but may not compete in similar lots in both Junior and Adult classes. Junior entries will be the same class and lot as the open entries. A "J" will be added to the Division for Junior Entries. In the upper left-hand corner of the entry form you would enter "NJ" in the space provided. To enter Cucumbers, lemon it would be numbered Division **NJ** Class 5 Lot 17.

Class 5 VEGETABLES

All specimens in one lot should be uniform in size. Tops of root vegetables should be removed, leaving stub.
