Oregon Association of Nurserymen, Clackamas Chapter, will sponsor the Plant Sale. **Plants may be tagged** for purchase on the following dates and times:

Friday, August 21, Saturday, August 22,

HINTS ON PREPARING YOUR FLOWERS FOR THE FAIR

Gather flowers early in the morning or late in the evening. Place stems immediately in cool water (the first 30 seconds are what counts). Set container in a cool, draft-free place. Use a sharp knife and cut stem on a slant. Crush wood stems for at least 2". Let stand in deep water overnight. Example: Chrysanthemums, Lilacs and Roses. Roses may be cut and placed in water in the refrigerator and protected by paper. Remove foliage of Asters, Zinnias, Stock, Snapdragons below the water line for arrangements. Stray petals can be removed without harming the quality of the flower. Carnations, Dahlias, Chrysanthemums should be cut when fully open. Most others, when buds are just beginning to open. A judge would rather see a flower coming into bloom than when the prime is past. Gladioli should be evenly spaced on the stalk. Dahlias are hollow stemmed. Place cut Dahlia stems to a depth of 2-3" in 160-180° water, protecting the blooms and leaves from the heat and steam by a collar of paper. Let stand in water in a cool shaded area for 2 hours or more, then add more water. Annuals such as Marigold, Asters, Cornflowers only require immediate submersion in cool water - overnight, if possible. It is important that all exhibits be named correctly. Check your exhibits for insect damage. Groom and clean your horticulture specimens. For ideas on arranging, our local library has many beneficial books for everyone. Transport your entries carefully so they do not bend and break or get bruised.

ATTENTION EXHIBITORS: SAVE TIME ON ENTRY DAY

We urge you to bring a completed entry form to the fairgrounds with your entries.

If you have a number of entries, we suggest that for each entry you also bring a gummed name and address label to be placed on your exhibitor's entry tags. This will avoid the tedious task of filling in your name with pen or pencil on each entry tag.

1. Entries will be accepted from **11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Monday, August 17. Entries WILL NOT be accepted after 8:00 p.m.** It is requested that exhibitors with numerous entries MUST BE IN THE DEPARTMENT at least one hour before entries close.
2. Department closed during judging and will not be open to the public until noon, Tuesday, the opening day of the Fair. Nationally accredited judges will judge flowers and arrangements the first day of the fair.
3. **NEW! All entries must furnish their own clear or see through vase or jar for display that is in proper proportion to the flower you are showing—NO solid containers.** Put your name on the bottom of the vases you would like returned to you after the close of the fair. The Fair Board will not be responsible for exhibits or containers, but reasonable care will be exercised.
4. The Fair Board reserves the right to reject diseased or other unacceptable material. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove any material deemed not in good condition and not of show quality.
5. All horticulture specimens must be grown by the exhibitors. Name horticulture specimens if at all possible. Preference given to named

varieties when judging. All horticulture specimens must have their own foliage except where noted. Judges may be impressed by grooming and staging of exhibits.

6. Material used in the arrangements division must be field grown. Arrangements must be made by the exhibitor.
7. No awards will be made if not warranted.
8. Professional or licensed growers or florists may not enter in amateur division.
9. An exhibitor may make only one entry in each lot.
10. Juniors may not compete in similar lots in both junior and adult classes. Exhibitors in class 21 and 24 must be 15 years old or younger.
11. At discretion of the judges, additional lots may be added if justified by numbers of entries.
12. **RELEASE TIME:** Entries may be picked up from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday, the day following the Fair. Please have your owner's exhibitor's claim check. Checks for premiums will be given out by the superintendent as exhibits are released, when possible. **NO CHECKS OR RIBBONS will be mailed.**

ARRANGEMENTS RULES

- Arrangements should be brought to the fairground between 10 a.m. and 9 p.m. Monday, the day before the Fair.
- We provide a minimum of security, please do not put keepsakes in your display. Clackamas County Fair not responsible for lost items.
- While arranging your display, water it well. Arrangements will not be watered until after judging on Tuesday. Containers should be large enough to provide water for at least two days.
- Arrangements should be well anchored in case of wind. Accessories permitted, not to exceed 26" in length.
- We hope exhibitors can plan a day at the Fair for Thursday, and renew their arrangements between 8:00 am – 9:00 am as needed on that day. Exhibitors are requested to maintain their display if possible. See superintendent for assistance if necessary.
- Each arrangement must be made by the exhibitor, and no commercially grown material may be used.
- Arrangements will be left for the entire week of the Fair.
- RELEASE TIME: Entries may be picked up from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday, the day following the Fair.
